Hi Grandpa, just writing this letter to share the memories that stick out the most between us. Well one of my earliest memories with you you we're watching Michael and I and we we're coming back from somewhere far, not sure where but I think the ranch. We stopped at a store and you and Grandma bought me a Barney stuffed animal. I was either three or four. I really loved that stuffed animal and kept it for a long time. Another time when I was around 7 you gave me an antique Smokey the Bear pin from when you were in the Forest Service which I still have today. Another time you were watching Michael and me and you had two hats from when you were in the Army and two tool pouches from the forest service that you gave to us. I remember you introducing me to chocolate chip pancakes one morning before helping my Dad out with his roof when I was about five or six. Also the time you brought my Dad, Michael and me to the cement boat at Seacliff Beach to go fishing (I think it was twice).

I will always remember all the fun times my cousins and myself had at your house and all the cool stuff you would do for us. One time in particular I remember you let Mitchell and me play with a wind-up record player all day and we had so much fun, we couldn't figure out why they stopped making them. Powwows and those Indian drums will always remind me of you because you brought me to quite a few powwows. You bought me an owl pin one time and I remember you introducing me to sweet bread. I remember driving to Arroyo Seco with you and stopping at a

Mexican restaurant in Gonzales a few times. One time at that restaurant I remember having my first tostada that was not from Taco Bell. Another time in Gonzales you introduced me to Chile Colorado. That's my favorite Mexican dish to this day, oh the soft tender beef in red sauce ☐. I remember you teaching me at your dinner table how to properly make a baked potato and squish the sides, which I still do to this day. I remember around five or six years old you teaching me knife safety, how to handle a knife, how to check if it's sharp and how to sharpen a knife. I can still taste the Popsicles that you used to hand out to my cousins and me on those hot summer days.

Then there's all the knowledge my Dad passed down to me that was passed down from you. Mostly mechanical, handyman, and Outdoors knowledge. Off the top of my head I can remember my Dad teaching me how to walk like a bear at Arroyo Seco when we were on Uncle Skips property. I remember my Dad teaching me the proper way to hold oil and antifreeze containers when pouring them, with the opening facing up while you're pouring. Also when you're swinging a Hammer not to choke it.

Then there were the later years, building my Mustang at your house. I will always remember my Dad and me trying to get that transmission lined up and in for 2 days straight and the third day we came you put it in all by yourself the evening before. I remember when we first started my Mustang and I got to drive it to the muffler shop without mufflers. Then there was the time you moved me into your house when I was on probation and drugs and you did everything you could to help me. Between

the Mustang, the Toyota Tacoma and you trying to help me when I was on drugs, I was really unappreciative back then and took it for granted. I just I want to say looking back I'm extremely grateful for having the loving and caring Grandpa that God put in my life. You are a one-of-a-kind Grandpa and I love you with all my heart and soul! I'm also really grateful you got to see me turn my life around and start a family. Thankyou for everything, it's such a blessing being your grandson. I love you.

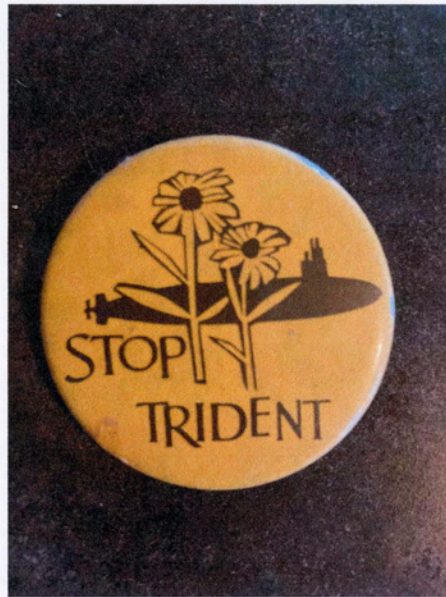
Bob Aldridge changed my life. With his book *First Strike*, I went from well meaning under-educated activist in northern Wisconsin to a dedicated and persuasive activist, organizer, and nonviolent resister to the thermonuclear command base, Project ELF, which he made easy to understand in his book. When I went on trial with my Plowshares partner Donna Howard in 1996, we faced many years in prison and Bob generously came to the trial, testified about ELF and told the jury that the command base had nothing to do with defending our country, he was key in getting us acquitted of sabotage because the sabotage law referred only to defense of the US. Bob patiently explained to the jury what he knew and what, therefore, we knew, and we thus got a decade less time in prison. More importantly, we won and that war trigger is now dismantled. The world owes Bob a great debt and I continue to owe him my gratitude.

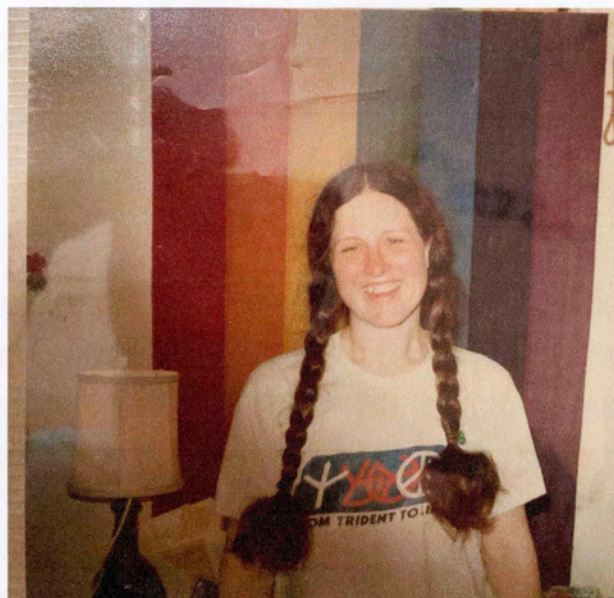
Bob,

Anything that may seem too much for each of us at the time is indeed possible - for any and all of us, wherever we may be.

You and your family are examples of what Bob has appealed to us by his books to become - proactive, nonviolence practitioners in the Goodness Field for the sake of our entire family in the kindom of God.

It's hard to remember a time when the Aldridge family wasn't in our lives. Ever since the trial for the Hickam Action in Honolulu (1972) that family has been on our radar - usually ahead of us. Just two examples of the profound effect they've had on our lives:

After the Hickam Action we had moved back to British Columbia, where I was a theology student and Jim was writing another book. We had a call from Bob in 1975 saying he'd like to visit us in Hedley, our small-town home. Of course we were happy to host him and hear what he wanted to tell us, but we had no idea how his visit would reorient our lives.

Like many of our peers, we were burned out and exhausted after long years of opposing the Vietnam war. We hadn't consciously decided to back off, but in a way that's what we were doing. Bob's visit changed that - he told us about realizing the first strike capability of Trident, but we were really inspired by his family story: how the whole family retreated together and decided to unhook from the defense industrial system. That meant a big change in income for the whole family (10 kids!) and a return to work for Janet, as well as a new career for Bob in explaining the arms race to the peace movement.

For us the Aldridge family story was a call to deepen in our commitment to nonviolence, peace, and justice. Because of that

visit we called our also-burned-out friends together in a meeting at Vancouver School of Theology, where I was studying, and the original Pacific Life Community was formed. We intended to experiment with nonviolence as a way of life, and the Trident campaign would be the public side of the experiment. That's how the Trident campaign began - through the Aldridge family story.

Several years later the campaign was chugging along, and we had formed the Ground Zero Collective, bought property in Kitsap County next to the base, and were using it as a launching pad for demonstrations in Kitsap. Jim was spending a fair amount of time there, but nobody had really committed to being a GZ presence in Kitsap. A letter arrived from Bob. He was very discouraged because he said the peace movement wasn't taking the escalation of the arms race seriously enough.

It was a letter that challenged us to be more committed, and it led us to move down to Kitsap County, which became our home for 12 years. We eventually had a little group that moved to the county specifically to work on the Trident campaign, and focus on becoming neighbors as well as resisting the weapons. The Ground Zero story is a long one, but it all began with Bob and Janet and their family.

Since then we've been educated and challenged repeatedly by their lives and example, and we can only offer the greatest thanks and respect to Bob, Janet, and all the Aldridges.

Thank you. We love you.

Bob Aldridge is a member in good standing of Veterans For Peace Chapter 101. In 2020 Bob talked to me about submitting a Satyagraha resolution to Veterans For Peace for consideration at the VFP 2020 national convention. We determined that the resolution would have a better chance of passing if the chapter submitted the resolution rather than an individual member. The first step was to get the approval of chapter 101 which wasn't difficult. I submitted the resolution to Veterans For Peace for Bob and VFP chapter 101 and Bob's resolution was passed with 366 voting members saying yes.

I emailed the members of VFP on the chapter contact list to make them aware of Bob's offer and received twenty-two requests for books which I then mailed. Bob generously distributed free of charge over

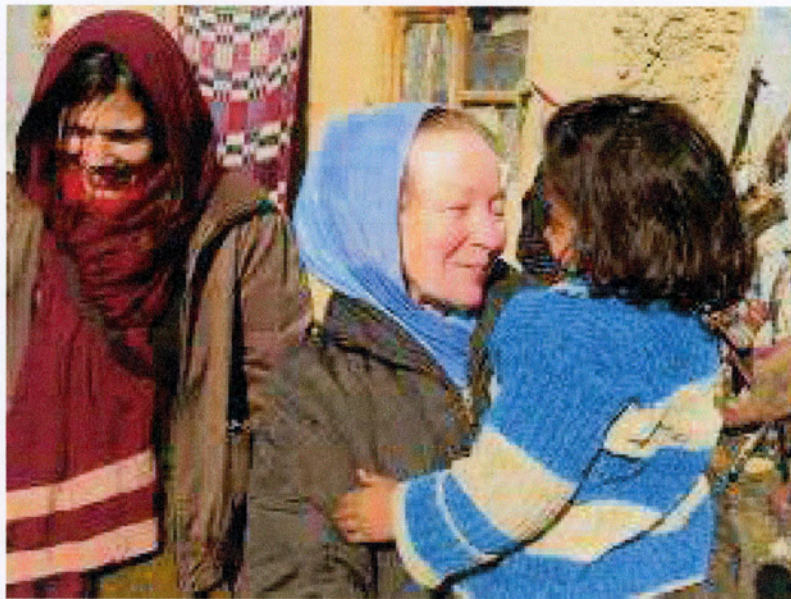
fifty books to members of Veterans For Peace that I am aware of.

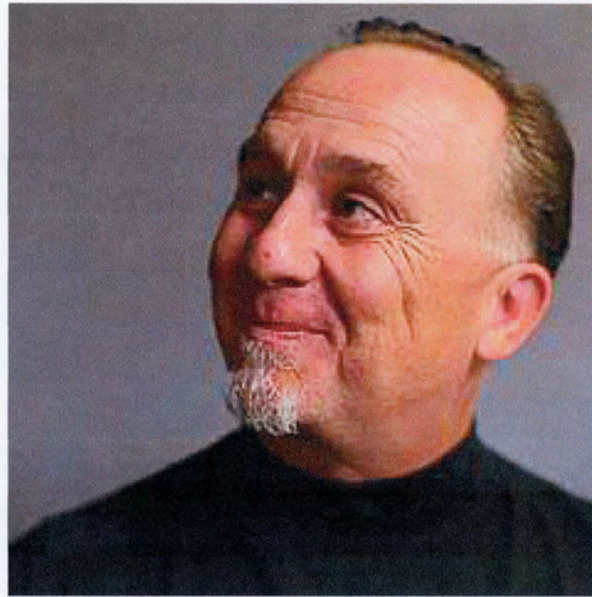

Many of us encountered Bob and Janet as young activists with Pacific Life Community in the 1970s. They offered us guidance, stability, and most importantly, inspiration about how to live a life of difference.

Bob's vision of peacemaking has stretched deep and wide, as evidenced by his corpus of publications. I owe my introduction to Indigenous communities to his early advocacy for a Pan-Pacific movement of resistance to Trident, and my involvement with the Nuclear Free and Independent Pacific movement beginning in 1980 change the course of my life. I was honored to co-author the 1989 book on Palau with Bob, and our correspondence and occasional visits over the years have been deeply grounding for me.

Janet anchored our little movement with kindness, patience and hospitality. It was not enough that they parented their own brood; they also parented many of us! She remains gracious in her twilight.

I am deeply grateful to have known these once-in-a-generation peace warriors.

It has been a joy to know Janet and Bob over the years. I am a peace and anti-nuclear activist, now in my 80s, an active member of the UK Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, known across the world for the peace symbol. I first came across Bob when I was recommended to read his book, 'First Strike'. Here was an authoritative book showing that the Trident nuclear missiles were not 'defensive' but were offensive weapons with huge killing power designed to be used first. I often quoted from the book and from his later book, 'Nuclear Empire'. I then learned Bob's story of how he had left Lockheed Martin where he worked as a nuclear missile engineer on the development of the weapons and chose to devote the rest of his life to work for peace and to oppose these weapons of mass destruction. Times would not be easy for his large family, but he had the complete support of Janet and his family. I was overwhelmed by the story and was keen to spread the story among my friends here in the UK.

I was then in touch with Janet and Bob and was one of the hosts when they came to the UK, where Bob would meet with anti Trident protesters here. The UK had accepted four Trident nuclear armed submarines which the government liked to call, 'Britain's independent nuclear deterrent'; the only part of that phrase that was accurate was 'nuclear'. They certainly weren't independent; they were U.S. through and through. The submarines were at a deep water base, at Faslane, off the coast, in Scotland which Bob

called, 'the US forward base in Europe'. Also the missiles were, 'lease purchased' from the U.S. All of this, Bob had written about in great detail. So when he came to the UK he went to visit the campaigners at the Faslane Peace Camp in Scotland. Coming south from Scotland, Janet and Bob stayed with friends in the Lake District, in the north west of England. My husband and I went up to meet them to bring them to our house in Manchester where they could meet members of the Manchester City Council - Manchester was the first nuclear free zone city in the world. I remember on our day in the Lakes, how Bob, who had been a forester, and Janet liked the walks in the woods. At our house Janet who loved children was so pleased to visit our local toddlers' play group.

During the 80s, I had taken over the organisation of a network, People-to-People, which aimed to put peace and anti nuclear activists in touch with each other between the UK and the USA. It was clear governments and the military worked together, so it was important that anti nuclear activists should work together and exchange information. We had a very small amount of funding and managed to link up peace groups. Certainly very little appeared in the media in the UK about peace actions and activists in the USA and north America. Alas, that is still true today. When Bob had the idea for publishing the Trident Resister's Handbook, (everything you needed to know about the whole Trident system) he asked me if I could help promote it - which I did through the People-to-People network.

In the late 80s, I undertook speaking tours of the U.S. to gain support and funding for the case where Greenham Women Against Cruise Missiles took the US government to court. Greenham was the base in central England where U.S. Cruise missiles were to be deployed. There was a huge women's protest there with a women's peace camp established. Many women were often arrested for non-violent direct action, such as cutting the base fence, and they were taken to court.. The women then decided in turn to take the US government to court and a few came to New York to build the case. Bob Aldridge was an expert witness. And I, rather late, went on the fund raising tours. Even after the case ended, I continued to do speaking tours in different states. At first I had been touring in the mid-west and the south, but latterly I went to the west coast and stayed with Janet and Bob. I have such happy memories of that - what kind and hospitable people they were. They made delicious meals for me, took me to see local sights, introduced me to other peace activists and friends in the area. I also remember reading to Bob's mother, who was by then blind, stories of their lives which she liked even with my English accent. Bob had devised so many ways to help his mother in her blindness.

We have continued to stay in touch up to the present day. I always look forward to receiving Bob's 'musings'. He radiates love and goodness which we see in his very latest book, 'The Goodness Field', again this is a book for me from which to quote.

I have been very privileged to know Janet and Bob, such an inspirational couple, and want to thank them for what they have given to all of us, their friends.

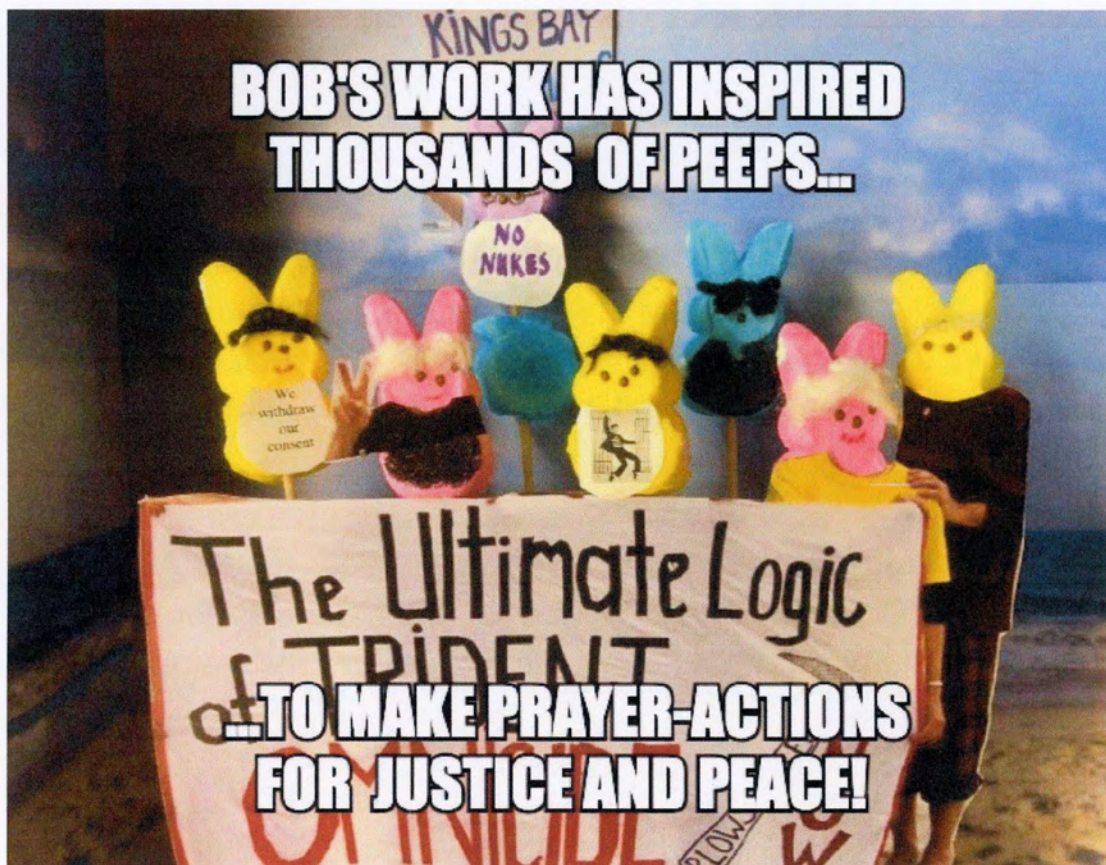

Bob (and Janet and family) help me to believe that peace is possible. And that redemption is achievable. It is difficult for me to speak of Bob because I fear I am missing something, but I will try.

I had heard the stories of how Bob began his personal resistance to nuclear weapons and how he planted the seeds of Trident resistance in the Pacific Northwest when I became involved with Ground Zero in the mid-1980s. All of these stories were worth repeating, and they have been many times. Starting with a young family at the time, I could appreciate the courage of Bob and his family when he quit his job at Lockheed.

When I later began communicating with Bob in the 1990s, I saw how he continually sought to bring people together, for understanding and for social change. I missed the early PLC work but I saw Bob's organizing of the Anti-Trident Network and his work with Stephen Kobasa on the Trident Information Network. And Bob's own Trident Resister's Handbook—which many of us depended upon for information. I might be wrong on this, but I don't recall ever seeing the term "first strike" used by the U.S. government until years after Bob revealed what it meant. I have no idea how Bob could do

this—to be right on so many issues and to inform and connect all of us.

Bob likely came for other trials, but he came to testify in Kitsap County in December 1998 when the County decided to prosecute peace activists for the first time in thirteen years.

Bob's knowledge and support was essential for me when I first began receiving records from the Navy on the risk of Trident propellant and Trident warheads.

But through it all—it seemed Bob wanted most to bring people together. In the Trident Resister's Handbook, Bob stated, "Nonviolence is a constant experiment in deepening in truth, and in testing the truth by betting our lives on it in the world." Bob, Janet, and family bet their lives on this truth.

Bob was visionary as well as practical with his peace work. I remember when he told me to get an e-mail account—a much better way for activists to communicate, faster, Bob said. I immediately did.

Several years ago, I noticed the mail out on the kitchen counter at Ground Zero. On top was an envelope from Bob, and I learned that Bob and Janet had been sending generous donations to Ground Zero each month. Each and every month, Ground Zero has received a hand-written donation from Bob. I cannot say how much that means to me—that through all these years, Bob and Janet still have faith in what

we are doing.

Bob, thank you for guiding us through difficult times and for showing us a course of action. You have been our inspiration and a practical guide.

I hope to begin writing an abbreviated history of Ground Zero and a chronology of Trident resistance in the Pacific Northwest. So many people these days have no idea of what is possible. I think our plans of nonviolent resistance and noncooperation with evil years ago worked—we needed others to stay with us and continue the work to abolish nuclear weapons.

In any case, if I can, I will begin with a chronology of Ground Zero. You and your family are the start of Trident resistance. You will be among the first entries.

I am forever grateful. Peace.
