

SUTTER'S FORT

After the restoration a landscape plan was made for the grounds and eventually two little lakes and a rustic bridge replaced the slough which once skirted the fort on the K Street side and was connected with the American River in high water. The Native Daughters of the Golden West have, from time to time, contributed trees and shrubs for the fort grounds. The grounds and beautifully-kept gardens, with the time-mellowed walls of the fort, now make one of the most delightful spots in the city.


When it was decided to convert the fort into a museum there was at first no definite policy regarding the scope and display of objects. In 1926 the State secured the services of the late Harry C. Peterson to survey the fort's needs and rehabilitate it. Curator Peterson recommended: that the museum reflect the California period from 1839, when Sutter came, to 1869, when the Gold Spike completed the transcontinental railroad; and that "the buildings, interior and exterior, be handled in such manner as will best retain and impart the romantic atmosphere of the Days of Forty-Nine." He then proceeded to carry out his ideas, with notable success.

The policy just referred to is still followed, and the staff is always glad to consider authentic and interesting objects of the Forties, Fifties and Sixties which would be suitable for the fort collection of firearms, clothing, household furnishings, tools, Daguerreotypes, photographs, diaries, letters, mining equipment, stagecoaches, fire engines, wagons and carts, hair wreaths, music boxes, trunks, strong boxes, prints, Pony Express and early telegraph items, printing presses



and old newspapers, and many other things. Approximately 7,000 objects are listed in the museum records.

The fort is open daily from 10 to 4 o'clock, including Sundays. Admission is free.

EXHIBITS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Hay Press: Just inside the main gate. This great device was built of wood in 1868, in Plumas County, and its huge oak screw, turned by horse- or mule-power, is a marvel of hand-carving.

Fire Bell Tower: Just inside the main gate. It formerly was on top of Young America Company, No. 6, fire station on 10th Street, between I and J, and was put up in the Fifties. The bell was rung to welcome the first Pony Express rider in 1860; tolled for the death of President Lincoln; and celebrated the driving of the Gold Spike completing the transcontinental railroad in 1869.

Newspaper Room: Old hand press, type cases, scarce specimens of California newspapers printed between 1846 and 1869. Also portraits of early editors, publishers and journalists. The *Placer Times*, Sacramento's first newspaper, was printed at the fort in 1849.

Peter Slater's Saloon: On this site Slater sold liquor to thirsty miners for a pinch of gold dust per drink. Earlier, James Wilson Marshall used the quarters for a woodworking shop. The restored saloon is typical of the gold-rush period, with its crude bar, old bottles, rustic chairs and gaming tables.

Native Sons' and Daughters' Room: Contains objects of early days collected by the Native Sons and Daughters of the Golden West. The site was formerly occupied by the miners' store of Priest, Lee & Co., in 1848.

Stagecoaches, Fire Engines, Etc.: These will be found under cover on either side of the Central Building. The Concord stagecoaches traveled many a dusty mile between mining camps such as Auburn, Placerville, Yankee Jims, Iowa Hill, Downieville, Rough and Ready, Bidwell Bar, Sonora, Columbia, Marysville and Port Wine. A stage driver was a man of importance—the envy of other men and the hero of small boys. He was the airplane pilot of his day.

Also on display are ox yokes; an old Mexican ox cart with wheels "sliced" from a solid log; Marysville's first steam fire engine; a hose cart of the Fifties from San Francisco; a great freight wagon of the Conestoga type; and an old hearse from Volcano, Amador County.

Central Building: Part of the original fort, this is of special interest because of its thick adobe walls and the great oak beams, hand-hewn, which may be seen in the basement, the entrance to which is under the steps on the west side. With the Kyburz Annex and basement, the Central Building contains five large rooms filled with objects which the pioneers of California

used in their domestic, commercial and social life. Here are personal objects of Sutter, Fremont, Marshall, Kit Carson; spurs, saddles, bits, carpet bags, surveying and musical instruments, sewing machines, clocks, costumes, branding irons, rare prints, photographs and shawls, spinning wheels, dishes and glassware. The skis which were used by the celebrated Snowshoe Thompson in the Fifties to carry the mail from Placerville to Genoa, Nevada, will be seen in the basement.


Pioneer Gallery: On the site of Sutter's distillery. Here are portraits of Californians who came west before 1869. There are also special displays of material designed to interpret the history of Sutter's time. These are changed periodically. The gallery contains a charming landscape, done in oils in 1852 by William S. Jewett, which shows a scene on Sutter's Hock Farm on the Feather River near Marysville. This historical painting was acquired by the State in 1943.

West End Rooms: This series of rooms, connected by a corridor, displays mining tools of the gold rush; household furnishings, hair wreaths, melodeons, music boxes, firearms, daggers and swords. The Donner Party exhibit is noteworthy, containing as it does many items of unquestioned authenticity relating to the tragedy in the winter of 1846-7, from the Patty Reed Lewis Estate. Included is material collected by Charles F. McGlashan while he was writing the history of the Donner Party in the '70s, and by Capt. Charles Davis on the Great Salt Desert in 1927, while retracing the Donner Party trail from Sutter's Fort to Fort Bridger. Also there is shown a record book of 13 marriages performed at or near Sutter's Fort in 1846-7, of which six were those of persons connected with the ill-fated party.

Blacksmith Shop: Located on the site of the one conducted by Ephraim Fairchild from 1847 to 1850. Here may be seen many old tools, a forge with its great hand-made bellows, and the innumerable sooty objects that collect in old blacksmith shops. During the gold rush there were sometimes as many as 20 blacksmiths at work, at wages of \$20 a day.

Sutter's Quarters: Three connecting rooms, just west of the main gate, have been restored as the bedroom, kitchen and office of General Sutter. It was in such rude surroundings as these that Marshall displayed the first gold which he brought from Sutter's sawmill at Coloma. The event is marked by a bronze tablet put up by the E Clampus Vitus society.

Museum Offices: Persons having business with Sutter's Fort Historical Museum will find the curator's offices adjoining the Art Gallery. Here are kept the museum records, the files of pictures and information relating to California pioneers and historical places and events. The staff is constantly adding to this material, which is available to students, historians, newspapers and the public generally. The museum's records include collections from

the Reading, Bidwell, Gregson, and many other families. Material not on display is available for study purposes when arrangements are made at the curator's office. Persons having California material of the period from 1839 to 1869 to donate to the museum may call at the office or write to the curator.

Sutter Plaque, Other Markers: On the south end of the Central Building is Taliabue's portrait in bas-relief of John A. Sutter. This was put up in 1939 during the centennial celebration commemorating the arrival of Sutter in 1839. The inscription follows:

This memorial erected by the Native Sons and Native Daughters of the Golden West in honor of the first Alcalde of New Helvetia; Captain in the regular Mexican Army; good Samaritan to the pioneers; one under whose regime gold was discovered; benefactor of the great State of California—

General John A. Sutter

Fort restored as result of movement inaugurated by Native Sons of the Golden West, the funds being originally provided by the order, the State of California and individuals.

August 12, 1939.

Also on the south end are three bronze tablets:

To the memory of

General John A. Sutter of Swiss origin who on August 12, 1839, founded New Helvetia which became California's capital city of Sacramento. This plaque has been presented by the Government of Switzerland May 30, 1939.




State Indian Museum: This is in an attractive building of early California style, on the fort grounds outside the walls, and with an entrance on K street. The curator is B. W. Hathaway. The museum specializes in the California Indian, but there is some material from the Pacific Northwest. The hours are the same as those of Sutter's Fort and admission is also free. Beadwork, baskets, implements of stone and bone, ceremonial garb, dug-outs, etc., are shown.




FORT BLACKSMITH SHOP. (McCurry Photo.)



Where once was Sutter's distillery, now will be found the gallery of pioneer portraits and special displays, which are changed from time to time.




STATE INDIAN MUSEUM, on the grounds of Sutter's Fort, facing K Street.



A RUSTIC BRIDGE crosses the lake where once was a slough linked with the river. The northwest bastion is on the left.





















Within but a few short years California will be celebrating its one hundredth year of statehood.

Here in Sacramento, a community which was one of the centers of excitement in the Gold Rush prologue to statehood, the official business of California has been conducted continuously since 1854.

Here in the State Capitol building, in Sutter's Fort, and the Crocker Art Gallery, visitors will find much which is revealing of the romantic and colorful history of the State.

Here visitors can likewise gain a fuller conception of the legislative and administrative activities of what is now the third largest State in the Nation.

California, as ever, has faith in its future. It welcomes visitors and it invites their inspection of its historic State buildings, parks and grounds.

State Capitol

Sacramento became California's capital city in 1854. Between 1849 and 1854 the seat of government had been frequently changed, with the cities of San Jose, Vallejo, Sacramento and Benicia each having held the honor for a brief space of time.

Before construction of the Capitol, the State's business in Sacramento was transacted in the old Sacramento County Courthouse. In 1860 the Legislature accepted Sacramento's gift of four blocks of land as a site for the Capitol building and appropriated \$500,000 as a construction fund.

Ground was broken on September 24, 1860, and the foundations were completed in December of that year but washed away by floods the following January. After this catastrophe, the grounds were terraced to raise the foundations above danger of further flood water damage.

The cornerstones were laid on May 15, 1861, but construction proceeded slowly. The roof went on in 1868, and the first and second floor offices and legislative halls were completed and occupied in 1869, although the exterior of the building was still unfinished. Construction proceeded throughout the succeeding years, and in 1874—14 years after the cornerstones had been laid—the building was declared complete. Remodeling was done in 1906-08, and in 1928.

The Capitol is Roman Corinthian in design, four stories in height, and surmounted by a large dome. A ball 30 inches in diameter, made of brass and plated with gold coins valued at \$300, is the crowning ornament.

The height of the building, from the grade at its base to the ball on top of the dome, is 237 feet; height, not including dome, 94 feet; length (greatest dimension), 320 feet; depth (greatest dimension), 164 feet; height from first floor to top of rotunda, 125 feet; area covered by building, 52,480 square feet; cost (including 1906-08 remodeling), \$2,977,925.

The exterior of the building (to the top of the first story) is of two distinct shades of gray granite, the darker shade having been quarried by the convicts at Folsom, and the sparkling lighter shade coming from quarries near Rocklin. The hardbaked brick construction of the upper stories and dome has an exterior coating of white mastic.

A Grecian laurel stands at the corner of 10th and L, and a banana tree from Abyssinia blooms in the L Street border between 11th and 12th. Nearby is a tamarix from Southern Europe; Kaki persimmon from the Orient; tulip tree, native to the United States; pomegranate from Persia; English hawthorne; Norway spruce from Central Europe; and oleander from China.

Noteworthy formal plantings near the Capitol building are the American Flag near 11th and L, the "V" for Victory at 11th and N, and a victory garden which provides fresh vegetables for the children of the Sacramento orphanage.

CALIFORNIA'S STATE TREE

Giant redwoods thrive on the terraces north and south of the Capitol. The redwood, said to be the tallest living thing in the world today, was made California's State Tree in 1937.

Sacramento's chosen flower—the camellia—provides one of the major spring attractions in the park. Augmenting the already famous older camellia trees is a new collection located between 12th and 13th Streets on L which was donated by the Native Sons and Daughters of the Golden West in 1942. More than 200 camellia trees of different varieties are to be found in the park.

In 1882, a group of Sacramentans planted 44 cork bark elm trees in a circle just east of the Capitol and used that area as an exercising track for their saddle and carriage horses. The circular pattern of these huge trees is readily discernible, and portions of the old track now serve as shaded walks.

Dividing the wide sweep of park east of the Capitol Building is a wide walk-way which is also reminiscent of earlier days in Sacramento. Closed today to all vehicular traffic, this walk-way was once the favorite carriage approach to the Capitol.

MEMORIAL GROVE

Along this walk-way will be found a grove of trees presented to the State May 1, 1897, by the Ladies of the GAR in memory of the Union Veterans of the Civil War. In this half-acre Memorial Grove are trees acquired as saplings from many famous battlefields of the Civil War.

On Capitol Avenue, near 12th and a short distance back of a well-stocked goldfish pond, grows a ribbonbush from the Solomon Islands. On down the avenue may be found a Montezuma cypress from Mexico, a loquat from the Orient, American century plants, formal Irish yews from Europe, a maidenhair tree from China, a madrone and a Monterey pine from the Pacific



It played a leading part.


Hurrying feet a path had made,






Balvin-Aldridge Rites Performed in St. Patrick's



TONIGHT'S GAME . . . Two Viewpoints

Tonight's game marks the dawn of another local football season at California Polytechnic college with all indications pointing to the fact that this campaign will be the most important in the relatively short but eventful history of the Mustangs.

This season the men of Coach Howie O'Daniels go into competition in the California Collegiate Association — second strongest grid conference on the Pacific Coast — and are faced with what is by all odds the toughest schedule in the 13 years the college has fielded a pigskin aggregation.

In fact, this fall may well be a "make or break" campaign for the Polymen as they strive to keep pace with other members of the 2C2A, San Jose State, Fresno State, College of the Pacific, Santa Barbara College and San Diego State. If the Poly pigskinners somehow turn in a successful season against these schools and other "toughies" including George Pepperdine, San Francisco State and the Cal Tech eleven which is here tonight they will be set for big time Pacific Coast recognition.

On the other hand, if the Mustangs come through with a mediocre season (which is much more likely) and win, say four or five games, they will be doomed to bathe in the fringe of the spotlight now focused on San Jose, Fresno and COP. In this event Cal Poly would be forced to wait another year, or two or even three to rise to the point of prominence at which it is aiming.

In opening before the home folks tonight against the Cal Tech Engineers, the Mustangs will find themselves up against a strong member of the Southern California conference. In four previous games Poly has scored three wins, ekeing out a 7-6 hair raiser in their last previous meeting in 1945. Two of the contests were route for the Mustangs as they pounded to 24-6 and 18-0 wins in 1939 and 1941, respectively. Tech captured the 1940 contest, 12-7.

Coach Howard O'Daniels came to California State Polytechnic College in 1933 from the University of Santa Clara, where he is known for his great gridiron work as a tackle on the Bronco elevens. While playing on Santa Clara teams of 1928, 1929 and 1930, he gained recognition for never being outplayed by an opponent lineman.

O'Daniels uses a modified T formation after being versed for many years in the Notre Dame offense at Santa Clara under such masters as Adam Walsh and Joe Boland, M. J. "Clipper" Smith and Buck Shaw.



CHUCK PAVELKO

POLY'S BACKFIELD COACH

Charles "Chuck" Pavelko is another Santa Clara University football great. While playing for the Bronco's, Pavelko was coached by Clipper Smith and Buck Shaw. He played fullback and quarterback for Santa Clara teams that dumped Louisiana State University in the Sugar Bowl of 1936 and 1937.

Pavelko also has played professional football, quarterbacking the Los Angeles Bulldogs after finishing college. During that time he coached the Bulldog backfield.

He returned to Cal Poly last year to assist O'Daniels in the first post-war football team.




PETE MEHRINGER

Tonight also marks the first public appearance of the 1947-48 season of the 50-piece Cal Poly band, led by drum major Milton Riggs.

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

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

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

William Lanz . . . lettered as a quarterback last year . . . is from North Dakota.

Brad Houser . . . lettered at end last year . . . has been shifted to center this year.

Glenn Chaffee . . . outstanding kicker on the West Coast last year . . . plays the left half post in the single wing formation . . . he did most of the passing last year . . . was named on the All Conference 1946 second team.

The Colts, Poly's J. V.'s, will vie with Fresno J. V.'s here on October 4.



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

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
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MUSTANG



Dr. Carl Voltmer, director of athletics, was appointed head of the athletic department in 1946. He is a graduate of The University of Iowa where he received the Big Ten medal for scholarship and athletic proficiency. He was director of athletics and football coach at Central Missouri State college from 1934 to 1944.



Richard "Dick" Anderson from the University of Southern California serves as head man in swimming. He coached at USC last year where he assisted Fred Cady, Olympic diving coach. Anderson served in the navy from 1942 to 1946 as a lieutenant.



Edward Jorgensen, a graduate of Chico State in 1936 where he earned eight letters, came to Poly this year to take over the duties of head basketball and track mentor and assistant frosh coach. He has coached at Southfork, Ferndale and Watsonville High schools and Marin Junior College.

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MENTORS



Charles "Chuck" Pavelko played football for Santa Clara under Clipper Smith and Buck Shaw. He was first string on two did graduate work at Whittier college. Pavelko played pro ball for the Los Angeles Bulldogs after his college days. Before the war interrupted Poly football, he assisted O'Daniels here for one year, 1941.



Robert Mott, a graduate of the University of Akron in 1938 handles the Mustang's baseball squad. He was high school coach for four years, then served in the navy as a lieutenant. After his discharge he received his masters degree at Southern California, then came to Poly in 1946.



Howard "Howie" O'Daniels is known as one of Santa Clara's all-time gridiron greats, where he earned the honor of never being outplayed by an opposing lineman. He is well versed in both the T and the Notre Dame system and also played under Clipper Smith and Buck Shaw, getting degree from Santa Clara in 1931.

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All-Time Cal Poly Eleven

Since Coach Howard O'Daniels in 1933 took over the reigns as head of football at California Polytechnic college, numerous outstanding players, representing top Poly teams, have galloped over Poly Stadium and outside gridirons. Although it is hard to pick outstanding teams over a period of 10 years, Coach O'Daniels, for the benefit of returning alumni and Mustang followers, has named first and second string All-Poly teams. All-Timer Highlights

Heading the list is Hugh "Huey" Long, one of the greatest blocking backs ever to play on a Poly team. O'Daniels rated him on a par with Nello Falaschi, the great All-American who was considered the greatest blocker in the history of Santa Clara University football. Long also was a great line backer.

In the line, Bill Nakunas was considered as rugged as the coal mines of Pennsylvania could make him. A letterman from the 1939 squad, Nakunas is picked by O'Daniels as tackle on the all-time Poly team. He had everything necessary for a great tackle.

Ed "Buck" Schwander, one of the hardest fighting linemen ever to don a Mustang uniform, is picked at one of the guard spots. Buck carried his fighting spirit into World War II. He was killed in a Texas plane crash.

Big Jim Yates, named as first string fullback, is undoubtedly the greatest pile driver ever to perform for Cal Poly. Playing last year, opposing linemen on teams played by the Mustangs this year, still talk about the smashing drives of Yates.

Joe Santos, weighing 165 pounds, was called O'Daniels ace pass tosser in 1939. He was great on end sweeps and cutbacks.

Ossie "Legs" Dusina played here in 1936 and 1937 and returned 10 years later to play for Coach O'Daniels. When the going was the roughest, "Legs" was at his best. Dusina was outstanding defensively from his guard position.

Harry Wineroth, 200-pound pivot man, was student body president at Cal Poly in 1938. O'Daniels rates him as the greatest center to ever play for him.

Bob Schurman, playing end on the 1940 varsity, was talented when it came to catching passes. He also was a great blocking end.

A top scorer on the 1940 grid machine, Pat Smith was tabbed the hardest running back on the gridiron and thrilled the spectators with long and tricky broken field runs. Although weighing 190 pounds, his running ability could not be matched. He also was a good pass receiver.

Len Canavan, 207 pounds of dynamite was named time and time again as the outstanding defensive lineman while playing tackle on O'Daniels' 1940 team. He was a vicious tackler and line player.

Henry Vervais, a rangy end, was one of the truly great pass receivers in Mustang history. A wonder on defense, it has been said no opponent ever rounded his end.



Ossie Dusina

Ossie Dusina was nicknamed "Legs" by his teammates because of his powerfully built underpins. The power in those legs was evident in the way Dusina tore up the opposing line. He was a tiger on defense and a constant worry to opponent backfield men. He played guard for O'Daniels in 1936 and 1937 and returned 10 years later to play in 1946.



Jim Yates

The greatest fullback to hit Cal Poly campus was named by Howard O'Daniels to be Jim Yates. Yates, from the Porterville area, played last year for Cal Poly but failed to return to school this year. Yates was second in scoring for the Mustangs in 1946.

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

Pump House Levelled By Blast



Late Sunday 110 gallons of gasoline stored in two drums exploded from backfire of this stationary engine on the Bonny Doon airport ranch of Charles

Saroglia. The rancher was badly burned and his condition was described as "very serious" at Santa Cruz hospital today. These un-

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identified state division of forestry fire fighters dampened down around the pump house shack to prevent spot fires. Total damage was estimated at \$1200.

Bonny Doon Rancher Hurt In Explosion

Charles Saroglia, 58, longtime Bonny Doon area rancher is in serious condition in the Santa Cruz hospital suffering from third degree burns caused by the explosion of two 55-gallon gasoline drums at the Bonny Doon airport at 7:20 p.m. yesterday.

Physicians at the Santa Cruz hospital said that Saroglia's condition was "very serious." They stated that he had incurred first, second, and third degree burns along his entire back, left arm and hand, and that transfusions were being administered.

A dispatcher at the Felton state division of forestry said the explosion was caused by the backfire of a stationary gasoline engine in a pump house. Saroglia was working on the engine and when it backfired flames quickly spread throughout the interior of a shack housing the pumping equipment.

In a few minutes the gasoline pumps exploded sending flames more than 100 feet in the air. Assistant Ranger Del Curtis and three trucks, assisted by Foreman Bradbury and a truck from the nearby CYA camp put out numerous spot fires in a field. Burning debris floated through

the air and set grass fires when it landed.

Coming at dusk, the flames were seen as far away as Loma Prieta look-out. The mountain is about 20 airline miles away. The fire was also seen at Camp Evers and other high points in the Santa Cruz mountains.

Deputy Sheriff Lowell Rountree was off duty last night and saw the flames from his home at 3196 Glen Canyon road. He said when he saw the blaze his first thought was, "My gosh, another Empire grade forest fire."

Extent of damage was not determined today but forestry fire fighters said the shack housing the pump was a total loss.
